Context Building:

Climate Change in the San Joaquin Valley and Our Communities of Focus



Where Are We?

- The San Joaquin Valley (SJV) is almost entirely enclosed by mountains.
 - Sierra Nevada Mountains to the east
 - Coast Ranges to the west
- San Joaquin County...
 - Has a population of almost 780,000 people
 - Is the 14th largest county in the state
 - Contains about 43% of the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta within its borders, making up a third of our total area in the county.

Environmental and Health Impacts in Our Communities

Stockton

- Top Climate Risks: **heat, fire, and flood**

Tracy

- Top Climate Risks: **heat and drought**


Lodi

- Top Climate Risks: **heat, flood, and storm**


County Overall

- Air quality in SJC is some of the worst in the nation. Small and large airborne particles from highways and traffic affect each of our communities greatly.

Ways to Address Environmental Risk

Addressing Heat Risk

- Tree planting along streets to provide shade
- Retrofitting homes and buildings with better AC services, or cool roofs
- Building covered bus stops to shade public transit users



Addressing Flood Risk

- Improve stormwater drainage in flood prone areas
- Creating community led alerts and evacuation plans



Addressing Fire Risk

- Requiring fire resistant landscaping for new buildings in high risk areas
- Trimming tall grasses and plants along home perimeters
- Creating community led alerts and evacuation plans



A Commitment to Our Future

- Each of our cities has previously adopted a strategy or plan to help guide community sustainability and climate action.
 - Tracy's Sustainability Action Plan - 2011
 - Stockton's Climate Action Plan - 2014
 - Lodi's Climate Action Plan - 2014
- Your experiences can shape how you want to address environmental concerns you see in your communities now in order to build resiliency for the future.


